- 3.) She was born the same day as Arnold Schwarzenegger.

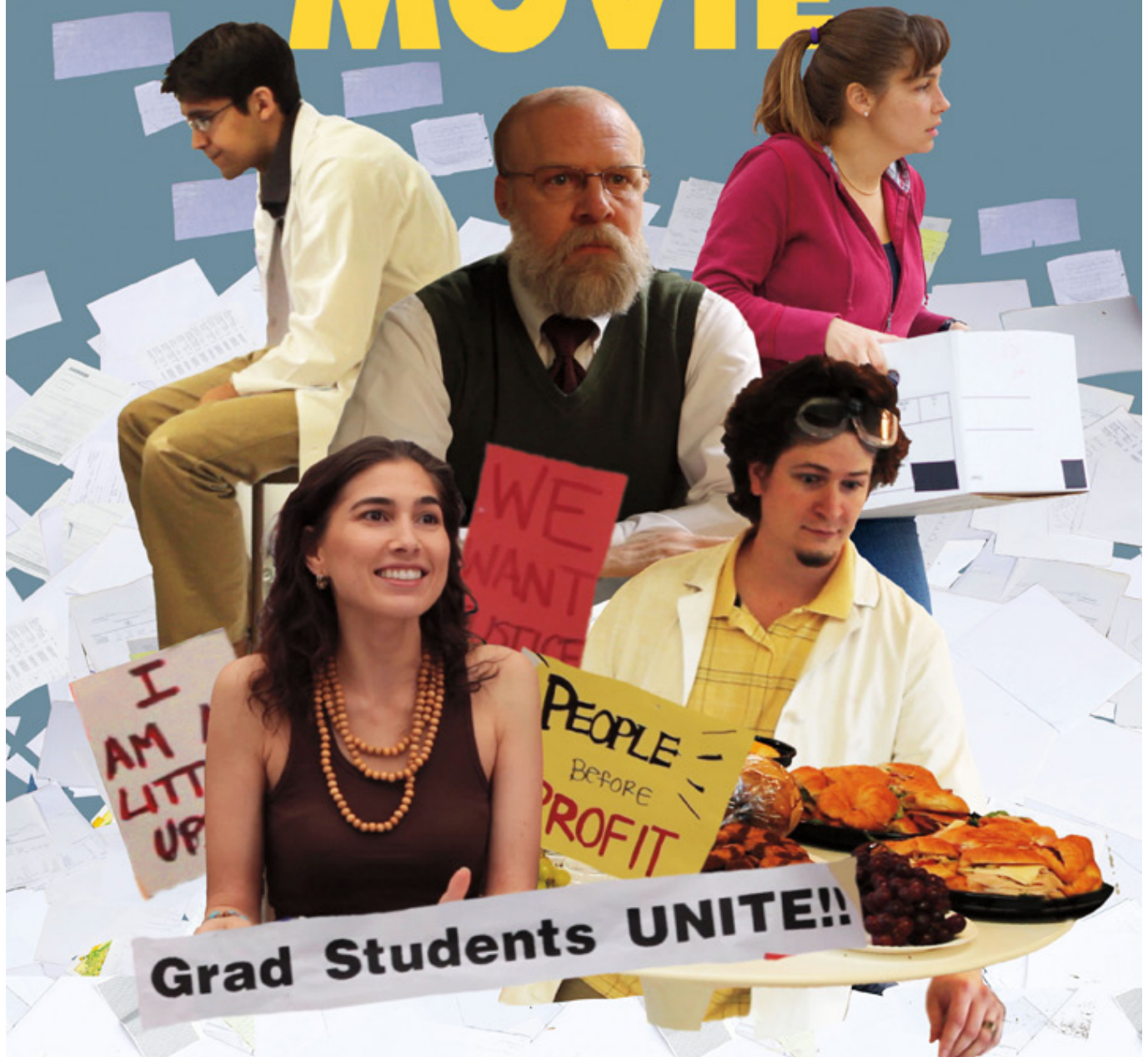
