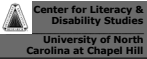
Purpose

- The purpose of the *New Voices* tool is to address a critical need for more equitable and widespread access to high quality AAC assessments and device recommendations.



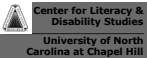
Rationale

- ❑ Limited access to interdisciplinary assessment services
 - Major metropolitan areas
 - Coordinated systems across regions, states, provinces
- ❑ High costs of comprehensive AAC assessment
 - Preliminary information gathering and preparation
 - Direct assessment time
 - Prescribing and securing funding for AAC technologies



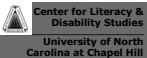
North Carolina as an Example

- ❑ 85% decline in availability of services.
- ❑ Diminished external support to off-set high costs.
- ❑ In a 12-month period during 2006-2007, 2,419 requests were made to our state assistive technology project for AAC assessment services.
 - They requests could not be met.
- ❑ An estimated 750 children across the state are in immediate need of assessment services.



The New Voices Assessment Tool ...

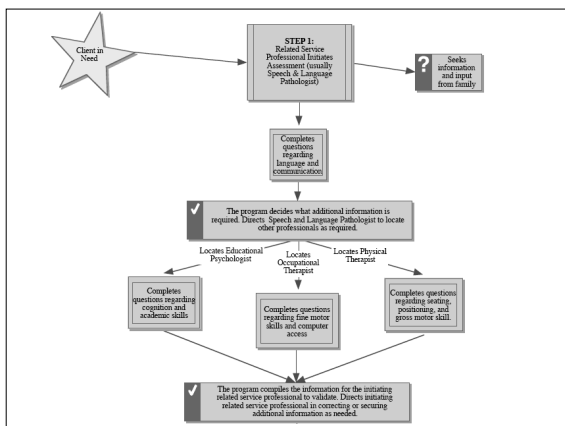
- ❑ Increases the efficiency of existing teams
 - Reduces intake and planning time
 - Takes advantage of local expertise
 - Generates reports in multiple formats simultaneously
- ❑ Allows individual allied health professionals, educators, and/or parents to initiate the assessment process
 - Guides the collection of relevant information
 - Supports professionals working in tandem

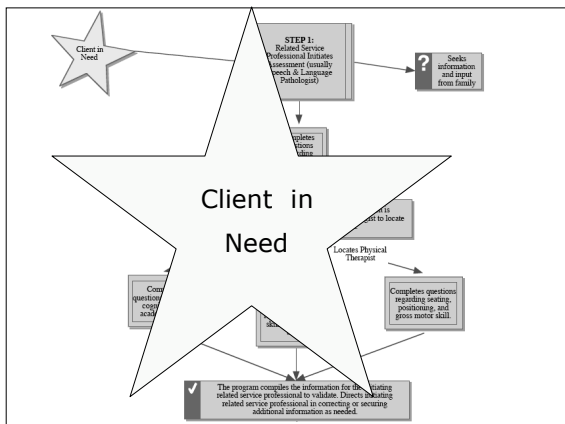


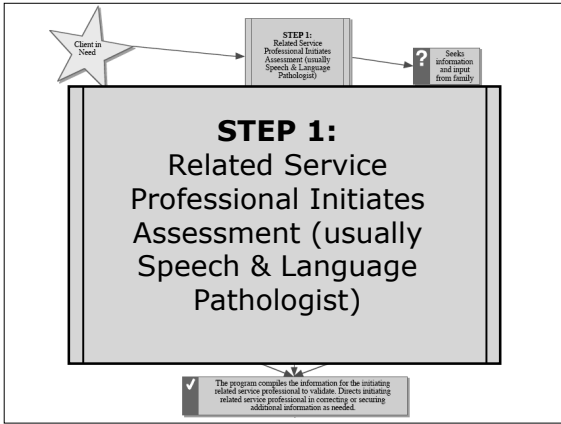

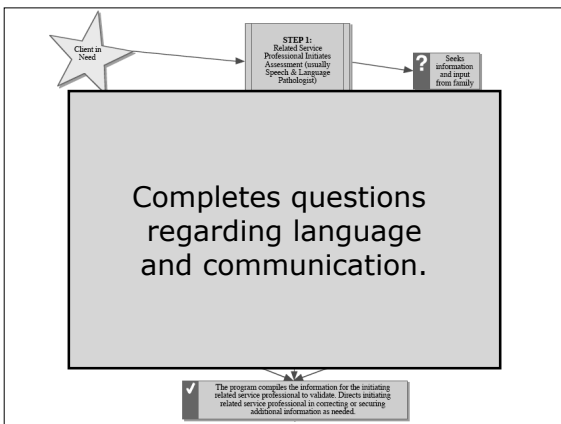


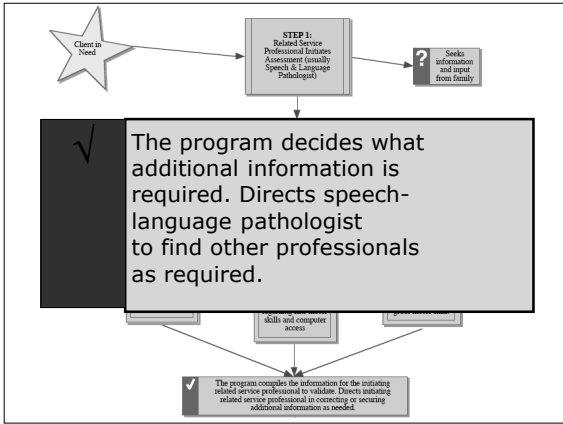


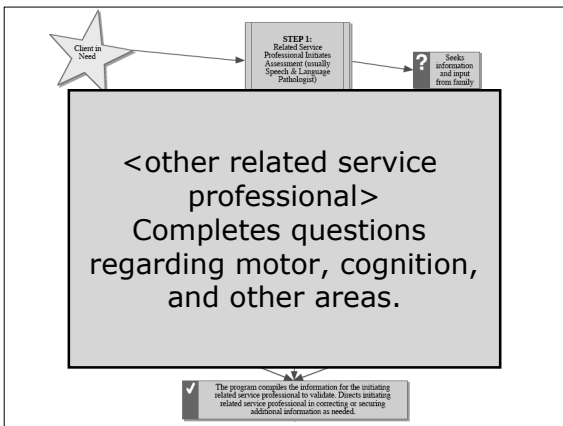


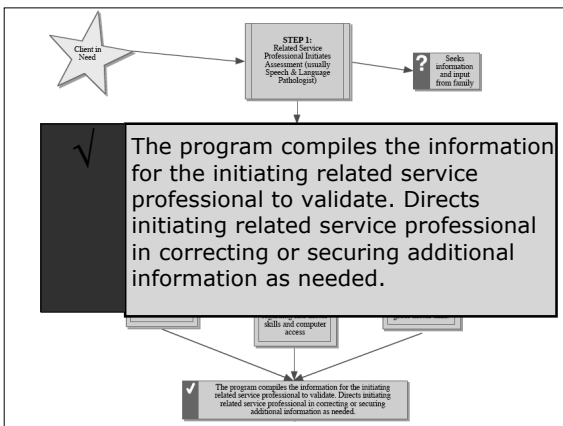


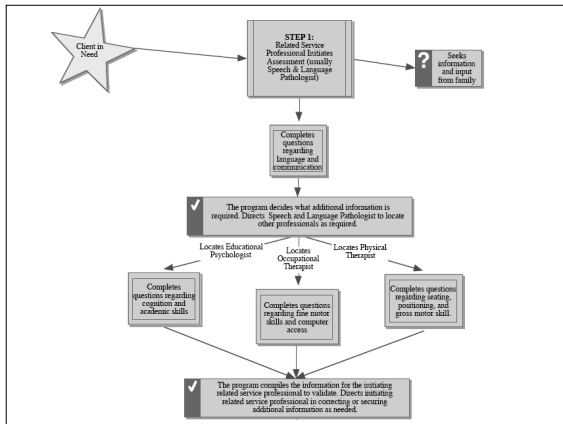














The New Voices Tool includes assessment questions in the following areas:


- Receptive Language
- Expressive Language
- Communication Competence
- Oral Motor
- Cognitive Development
- Sensory
- Access
- Positioning


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Question Development Process

- Work with members of existing assessment teams to identify necessary information.
 - Team members generate first draft.
 - Questions are vetted by NEC New Voices Assessment teams.
- Determine relationships among questions and flow.
 - Respond only to relevant questions.
 - Gather all available information.

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Example Question Format

Does the child have difficulty with certain noises?

This is a yes/no question.

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Example Question Format

Can the child imitate any of the following physical movements?

This is a radio button question.

Clapping

Nodding

Blinking

Mouth Movements

Hand Movements


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Example Question Format

What information is available regarding the child's hearing?

This is an unrestricted text field.

He has severe bilateral hearing loss and is currently under evaluation for a cochlear implant.


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Reviewing and Changing Responses

There are 10 answered questions. To change an answer to a question, click on its link.

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Generating Reports

- Multiple report formats provided.
- Generate multiple reports simultaneously.
- Option to upload personalized report templates.

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Future Development

- Continue to refine questions and flow.
- Complete report generating process.
- Streamline child registration and evaluator invitation process.
- Investigate the time savings and increased access to assessment services.
