Target Audience & Purpose

This training is targeted for medical providers and is geared to provide specialized medical education that will assist in the evaluation, diagnosis and management of children with a suspicion of maltreatment.

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Learning Objectives

The information presented at this education activity should improve your ability to: (1) increase your recognition of child abuse and neglect, (2) increase your reporting rate to child protective services when there are concerns for child abuse and neglect, (3) recognize and consider the patient and clinician factors which may impact your recognition of child abuse and neglect and your decision-making in reporting concerns for child abuse and neglect; and (4) utilize the latest guidelines in evaluating children for concerns of abuse and neglect.

Participants will be provided with lecture on the evaluation of child maltreatment to include indicated diagnostics, follow-up medical and mental health recommendations and reporting requirements to the Department of Social Services and law enforcement.

Interactive case studies in child abuse & neglect will be utilized to illustrate the medical examination, recognizing normal and abnormal findings, implementing appropriate diagnostics and follow-up recommendations.

Participants will be provided with lecture and case studies focused on the documentation of findings, conclusions and recommendations.

Participants will demonstrate skills involving the physical exam, utilizing documentation techniques with written reports, body diagrams and photography.
