Greetings from the Hill! Dermatology has been full of hustle and bustle since our last newsletter.

We are currently planning to move our

entire clinical operations to a new site in Southern Village in Chapel Hill. You may recall that a few years ago we opened a new dermatology center at Southern Village to accommodate the demands for clinical services. The UNC Health Care System is expanding its ambulatory surgery and the team has decided our patients will be best served at a consolidated site. We hope to be up and running in the new center by this spring.

In the UNC HCS environment, we have the honor to serve a diverse group of patients from across the State of North Carolina. We value our long-term relationship with the Fayetteville VA Hospital and the care of veterans at that site and here at UNC through our agreement with TriCare. In this time of economic challenges for so many of our citizens, it is a critical part of our mission to work to serve those in need. We are continuously supporting our social mission by staffing clinics in partnership with the Student Health Action Coalition at the Piedmont Health Services facility in Carrboro. Dr. Lugo-Somolinos is actively engaged and directing the clinical trials unit and the outcomes skin research program for the Latino community of NC.

Additionally, she has a strong interest in contact dermatitis where she is involved in teaching our residents and providing dermatological care for patients in need of her expertise. Dr. Burkhart, as a pediatric dermatologist, brings the knowledge of treatment of vascular lesions with laser technology to our Department as well as giving us the ability to expand our pediatric services.

One of the joys of academic medicine is to have the opportunity to train the future generation of dermatologists in our outstanding residency program headed by Dr. Dean Morrell. Our residency program underwent a successful review by the RRC this past July and was approved for four years. We appreciate the hard work of Dr. Morrell, Cherie Ezuka, faculty, residents, and staff that were involved in the accreditation process. Dr. Craig Burkhart is now leading our educational program for medical students.

We are delighted that our research programs in keratinocyte biology, autoimmune blistering diseases and melanoma have continued to receive NIH support. Where Are They Now?

Eric Hanson ('02):

Almost seven years have past since I finished my chief resident year in June 2002. There is not a day that goes by I don't feel grateful for matching in dermatology, the excellent teaching that I received while at UNC and for the memories of residency that I carry with me.

I started my career at a large multispecialty clinic in Vancouver, Washington. I stayed for four years. Eighteen months ago my wife Jen (as business manager) and I opened our own clinic which we call Knott Street Dermatology (www.knottsstreetdermatology.com). Our main clinic is now a 12-minute walk along Knott Street

from our home, in Irvington, a Northeast Portland neighborhood. We also staff a satellite clinic 10 miles south in Milwaukie, Oregon where I bike commute to year round. By giving up the car, I have managed to combine exercise, stress reduction and a lower carbon footprint.

He has become quite an accomplished swimmer winning both the 50 and 100 meter backstroke, at the short-course Sectional championships in March (a 7-state meet!). Luis Diaz, Professor and Chairman, UNC Dermatology and **David Rubenstein** ('97), Professor, UNC Dermatology, were recognized among UNC's 198 Best Doctors of America for 2007. They were recognized at the April 29th Spring Faculty meeting.

Steve Feldman ('90), Professor of Dermatology, Pathology, and Public Health Sciences at Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center School of Medicine, had a theory published in the Archives of Dermatology that there is a lot of phenomena in dermatology that had crazy explanations are actually related to poor compliance with treatment. One example was Dr. Wheeler's aphorism to "use new medication before they stop working." It now appears the reason medications work so much better in research studies is better compliance in study patients than in clinic patients. In another study, Dr. Feldman looked at the compliance with 0.1% triamcinolone ointment in kids with atopic dermatitis. That study was done without telling the patients they were being monitored. Compliance dropped by about 60% in just 3 days. That probably explains well why outpatients we saw as residents would be resistant to 0.1% TAC ointment while the same kids would respond to the same medication in just 2 or 3 days when admitted to NC Memorial Hospital.





Research Awards

Zhi Liu, PI, NIH/NIAMS Competitive Renewal [9/2008] Immunopathogenesis of Bullous Pemphigoid: The long term goal is to increase our understanding of the pathophysiology & autoimmunity of BP and how it relates to the functions of autoantibodies & proteinases in inflammation & autoimmunity.

Ye Qian, PI, Dermatology Foundation Research Award [7/2008] *Allergic response associated with IgG4 autoantibodies & their pathogenicity in autoimmune skin disease*. This project will identify IgG4 antibodies that are genetically related to those self-reactive IgE and test whether these IgG4 antibodies induce blisters in mice.
