The students do all the data entry, participate in data analysis, co-author the abstract and manuscript, and present their work in several different forums for their personal project. In addition, the students are provided with a didactic research lecture series to strengthen their foundation of knowledge. I continue to serve as the director for the Summer Research Program. The program concluded in the end of 2005 due to funding restraints.
