Dr. Margaret L. Moore, PT, Ed.D, FAPTA, was recruited to the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill by Dean W. Reece Berryhill to be the first chief of physical therapy at North Carolina Memorial Hospital before the hospital opened in 1952. From that time until her retirement in 1979, hers is a story of extraordinary vision, outspoken persistence, and fearless advocacy that did much to shape the field of physical therapy as we know it today.

Dr. Moore was a leader in advancing physical therapy curriculum grounded in basic medical sciences. It was she who foresaw the need for advanced degrees for physical therapists beyond baccalaureate programs. She also pioneered contractual arrangements for practicum training graduates, as well as continuing education programs to improve the skills of clinical preceptors.

As an assistant dean of the UNC School of Medicine, she promoted the establishment of the Department of Medical Allied Health Professions, thus assuring close links between the allied health disciplines and clinicians as well as in the clinical and basic science departments. Dr. Moore was a devoted and tireless member of the faculty, intensely involved in University affairs campus wide. Dr. Moore was an educator of great vision and a

devoted, strong voice for the physical therapy profession and the University.
