
COMMUNICATION PARTNER TRAINING

This concept has been developed from feedback by stroke survivors with aphasia and uses simple solutions like offering them the opportunity to express "yes", "no" or "I don't understand".

- This is a project to watch for future developments of CPT resources for the National Health System in the UK.
- The proposal: "In a future programme grant for applied research we propose creating a CPT programme and manual for its delivery in the NHS. We will co-design it with people with aphasia, family members, therapists and researchers. We will then see whether it is acceptable, feasible to deliver in the NHS and whether it is possible to conduct a larger study. A large study would be planned across several NHS speech and language therapy departments in the UK to determine how effective it is and to understand how best to make it available to NHS patients."
