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What is Primary Care?



- "First contact and continuing care for persons with any undiagnosed sign, symptom, or health concern" (American Academy of Family Physicians)
- Duties
 - ▶ Health promotion, disease prevention, health maintenance, counseling, patient education, diagnosis and treatment of acute and chronic illnesses
- Day-to-day healthcare given by a health care provider
- Often coordinate specialist care if needed

Shortage of Primary Care Physicians

- There is a growing shortage of primary care physicians (PCPs)
- Association of American Medical Colleges predicts a shortage of between 21,100 and 55,200 primary care physicians by 2032

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Shortage of Physicians

Increased demand

- ▶ Nation's population will grow by more than 10% by 2032
- Age 65+ will increase by 48%
- ▶ 1/3 of active doctors will be older than 65 in the next decade

Shortage of Primary Care Physicians

- Primary care as faces special challenges
- Income gap
 - Student loans
- Challenging work life
 - Making ends meet
 - Lowers quality of care

"The wide and growing income gap between primary care physicians and specialists, coupled with the challenging work life of primary care physicians, has led many U.S. medical graduates to avoid adult primary care careers" (Health Affairs)


Primary Care and Mental Health

Patients with mental health issues experience decreased access to and utilization of primary care

- Decreased capacity to make/attend appointments
- Lack of knowledge on mental health
- Stigma

Neuropsychiatric Disorders

- Often comorbid with other chronic conditions
- Utilize high levels of medical services and costs

Major Depressive Disorder

Epidemiology

- Lifetime Prevalence approximately 12 17%
- Females> Males
- ▶ 1st episode occurs < 40 yrs in 50% of patients.
- "Depression"

Major Depressive Disorder

Diagnosis

For > 2 weeks, 5 of the following:

Low mood or Anhedonia



- **S** Sleep Disturbance
- I Interest/Pleasure Reduction
- G Guilt
- **E** Energy Loss
- **C** Concentration impairment
- **A** Appetite Changes
- **P** Psychomotor changes
- **S** Suicidal Thoughts

Major Depressive Disorder

Duration

- ▶ Untreated MDD: ~9 months
- Treated MDD: 3 months

Prognosis

▶ 85% recurrence rate

Schizophrenia

Epidemiology

- ▶ Lifetime prevalence 1.5%
- Males slightly > females, and the age of onset differs
- ▶ 5% die from suicide over their lifetime

Schizophrenia

Diagnosis

- Must have 2 of these symptoms for > 1 month
- ▶ 1 must be one of the italicized symptoms

Positive Symptoms	Negative Symptoms
Delusions	Blunted Affect
Hallucinations	Alogia
Thought Disorganization	Anhedonia
Catatonia	Social Isolation

Medical Homes

Potential solution to primary care barriers for patients with mental health issues
