MY FAVORITE UNC MEMORY IS ... the soda machine in clinic. IYKYK. But really there are too many to narrow down to one!




## Sam Wilson (Class of 2022)

MY FAVORITE UNC MEMORY IS ... taking pictures of Julie Blatt when she finds food around clinic and stuffs it in her white coat pockets.






#### Betsy Finch (Class of 2018)
