## RESEARCH STATEMENT

My work lies at the intersection of public health, human rights, and social justice with a specific focus on sexual and gender minority health as well as HIV prevention and treatment. My goal is to participate in research, teaching, and practice that is responsive and accountable to marginalized communities. Toward that goal, I use my experience as a physician assistant with 24 years in clinical practice, a global public health practitioner with international HIV policy experience, and a social scientist with robust skills in theory-informed, mixed-methods research to advance health equity. I spent four years on faculty at Johns Hopkins and accepted an Assistant Professor position in the Department of Social Medicine at the University of North Carolina (UNC) at Chapel Hill in 2018. Since entering the tenure track, I have developed a strong research and teaching portfolio that has contributed to local, national, and global approaches to sexual and gender diversity and health. Below I outline these contributions in the categories of research and teaching.

My research is driven by the need to understand social inequalities that lead to health disparities and identify ways to build a more just and healthy society. Utilizing interdisciplinary approaches that bring together qualitative and quantitative methods, I have examined social and institutional factors that impede the right to the highest attainable standard of physical and mental health for sexual and gender minorities as well as people living with and vulnerable to HIV. My current research efforts fall into two

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broad areas of focus: transgender health and sexual minority health.

**Transgender Health:** Transgender people experience stigma, discrimination, and social exclusion that negatively impact their health. Most of my research has addressed transgender health inequities, with a focus on HIV. The heavy and disproportionate burden of HIV among transgender women worldwide was first documented in a 2013 systematic review that I co-authored with colleagues at Johns Hopkins. Since the study's publication, it has been cited more than 950 times (Baral, Poteat et al., *The Lancet Infectious Disease*, 2013). In my dissertation research funded by the Johns Hopkins Center for Health Disparities Solutions, I used qualitative grounded theory methods to assess the role of stigma in low healthcare utilization by transgender adults. I developed a conceptual framework for how stigma functions during encounters between health care providers and transgender patients, and used it to frame recommendations to improve health care access for transgender people (Poteat et al., *Social Science and Medicine*, 2013). I subsequently led a comprehensive review of HIV risk and prevention interventions among transgender women sex workers that was published in *The Lancet* in 2014 as part of a special series on sex work.

My recent work includes a comprehensive review of the literature on transgender health (Reisner, Poteat et al., *The Lancet*, 2016); a United States-based study of gaps in the HIV pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) continuum for transgender women of color (Poteat et al., *Journal of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndromes*, 2019); and a pioneering study of HIV PrEP engagement among transgender women in South Africa (Poteat et al., *The Lancet HIV*, 2020). My commitment to research on transgender health and HIV led to an invitation to provide the first plenary lecture on HIV in transgender populations for the 2016 *Conference on Retroviruses and Opportunistic Infections*, the premiere scientific meeting on HIV. I presented findings from my community-based study of HIV risk and care engagement among transgender women in Baltimore/DC at the *2017 International AIDS Society Conference*, as well as results from my multi-country study of HIV risk and prevalence among transgender women in sub-Saharan Africa.

In addition to HIV, I continue to address topics identified as important by the transgender community. Select projects include a qualitative assessment of chest masculinization desires and outcomes among transgender men, a transgender community-based needs assessment in partnership with the Maryland Department of Health, and a qualitative study of relationship dynamics and risk among transgender women and their male romantic partners. In keeping with ongoing efforts to reduce anti-transgender stigma and its health sequelae, I am the Principal Investigator for an R01 grant (Project Period: 2018-2023) from the National Institutes of Minority Health and Health Disparities (NIMHD) to examine stigma-induced chronic stress pathways that may lead to poor mental health and early cardiovascular disease among transgender women living with HIV. Since joining the faculty at University of North Carolina Chapel Hill, I have paid particular attention to the health needs of transgender people in the South. A key element of this work is my current research project addressing the HIV prevention and care priorities of transgender people of color in North Carolina and South Carolina, funded through a National Institutes of Health (NIH) supplement to the UNC Center for AIDS Research. I am excited to continue conducting community-engaged research that addresses pressing health inequities in vulnerable populations.

**Sexual Minority Health:** Despite recent advances in marriage equality in select countries, sexual minorities around the world continue to experience stigma, discrimination, and health disparities. As a doctoral student, I conducted a United Nations Development Program (UNDP)-funded qualitative rapid assessment that highlighted the negative impact of anti-homosexuality legislation on HIV among men

who have sex with men in Senegal (Poteat et al., *PLoS One*, 2011). My mixed methods analysis of bio-behavioral data from Lesotho has filled gaps in knowledge about stigma and the sexual health of lesbian and bisexual women (Poteat et al., *Culture Health and Sexuality*, 2014 and Poteat et al., *Reproductive Health Matters*, 2015). These studies in Senegal and Lesotho constitute some of the earliest data on the health of sexual minorities in sub-Saharan Africa and demonstrate my commitment to pioneering research on “invisible” sexual minority populations to bring critical disparities to light. Conducting research that not only documents social stigma and its health impact, but also explores interventions is essential to making change. Toward that end, I led a United States Agency for International Development (USAID)-funded longitudinal evaluation of gender and sexual diversity trainings for HIV program staff in 38 countries. The results provide evidence that a one-day training can improve attitudes towards sexual and gender minorities around the world and that these changes can be sustained for many months after the training ends (Poteat et al., *PLoS One*, 2017).

My commitment to addressing health disparities among sexual minorities is not limited to HIV nor global communities. From 2014-15, I partnered with a national community-based organization, ZAMI NOBLA, to conduct qualitative research on the health care needs of aging Black lesbians (Seelman, Adams, and Poteat, *Journal of Women and Aging*, 2017). Building on that successful partnership and looking toward addressing life-threatening disparities, we are currently analyzing data from our recently completed mixed-methods study of barriers to and facilitators of engagement in cancer care for Black sexual minority women; and we are beginning to collect data about the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on Black sexual minority women ages 40 years and older.

In 2019, I had the honor of being appointed to the National Academies of Science Consensus Panel on the Well-Being of Sexual and Gender Minorities, where I was tasked with co-leading the health chapter of our report that is due to be published by the end of 2020. The report identified significant gaps in knowledge about non-HIV chronic diseases in sexual and gender minorities. Existing large multi-site cohorts provide important opportunities to identify sexual and gender minority participants and better understand their health. As co-Principal Investigator for an National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI)-funded R01, I am excited to examine relationships between minority stress and cardiovascular disease among sexual and gender minorities in the Hispanic Community Health Study/Study of Latinos, a multi-site cohort study that has followed more than 15,000 participants since 2007. I am also co-investigator for another NHLBI-funded R01 examining the impact of multilevel stigma on the health of sexual and gender minorities participating in the Coronary Artery Risk Development in Young Adults (CARDIA) study, which has followed more than 5,000 participants since 1985. As my career progresses, I look forward to continuing to use the tools of theory-informed public health research to shed light on fundamental social causes of health inequities and promote effective, evidence-informed solutions.

#### TEACHING STATEMENT

I teach courses that address the social determinants of health focused on health inequities faced by sexual and gender minorities. The content raises sensitive and sometimes controversial topics about which students often have strong feelings. To facilitate learning, I set clear classroom ground rules that establish a basis for respectful communication while leaving room for disagreement and growth. I guide students to interrogate their assumptions and to use the scientific literature and their lived experiences as scaffolds upon which to build new knowledge. I believe teaching is about supporting intellectual development for everyone in the class. This requires allowing room for mistakes (e.g. by offering ungraded as well as graded assignments) and providing opportunities for critical thinking (e.g. through interactive exercises and assignments). My goal as an educator is to establish a learning

environment that provides enough psychological safety for students to take intellectual (and often emotional) risks, yet hold students to high enough standards that they understand the importance of making evidence-based arguments. I have been rewarded for this work with the 2017 Golden Apple Award, the highest teaching honor offered by the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. I continue to hold myself accountable to this high teaching standard at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill by engaging in teaching that facilitates growth and independent thinking for students. My core teaching responsibilities in the School of Medicine include teaching a seminar in the Social and Health Systems (SHS) 3 course for third semester medical students as part of the Foundation Phase. The goal of the seminar is to strengthen students' foundation for providing knowledgeable, culturally aware care for sexual and gender minority patients. Through course readings, multimedia content, small-group exercises, case studies, and reflection papers, students explore the historical, epidemiological, and social perspectives related to sexual and gender minority health. I look forward to continuing to teach in ways that expand the capacity of future physicians to care for society's most vulnerable people.
