Applications for the Medical Alumni Loyalty Fund scholarships are due on April 30.



Recognizing the potential benefits of dog interaction with patients, and each of them having loving dogs themselves, a group of three second year medical students – Jenna Beckham, Rachel Little and Olivia Linthavong – wanted to find an opportunity for their dogs to visit and provide these beneficial interactions to local older adult patients. Also knowing that many of their fellow classmates have gentle, affectionate dogs, they were motivated by a Humanities and Social Sciences Selective course, titled "Advanced Leadership in Community Service", to set up a program in which anyone with a dog can easily get their pet qualified for participating in this hospitality pet program. When Wendy Sapp, Activities Coordinator at Clare Bridge, an Alzheimer's and Dementia Care facility, was first contacted about the program, she was thrilled. She echoed the results of these aforementioned studies and added that the residents really "connect beautifully with animals".



The program has established easy access to local memory care, retirement and assisted living communities, including Clare Bridge, Wynwood, Carolina House, Carol Woods and Carolina Meadows, where residents can benefit from pet interaction. In the spirit of UNC Medicine, the program became known as, "Heeling Hounds".





Heeling Hounds was set up to provide free certification of dogs and to facilitate easy, personal scheduling in order for the owner to be able to establish visits that are conducive to their individual schedules. Though this program was started by medical students, involvement is in no way limited to only this group. Anyone can participate! Medical Alumni Loyalty Fund Scholarships

The UNC School of Medicine Medical Alumni Loyalty Fund scholarship program was established in 1966 with a modest stipend to six students. Because of generous alumni support, the program now provides over 50 scholarships each year based on need, merit and/or demonstrated leadership. These scholarships represent, as near as possible, full in-state tuition.

One year scholarships are awarded to rising second, third and fourth year students.

A committee comprised of representatives from the Office of Student Affairs, Financial Aid, Admissions, Alumni Affairs and the Medical Foundation of North Carolina select recipients. Criteria for selection include demonstrated financial need, academic achievement, leadership qualities and commitment to service.

Scholarship selection will be made by early June. Selected students will be notified as early as possible. Distribution of funds will be applied toward financial aid package (if applicable) and will be managed by the School of Medicine's Financial Aid Office.

Recipients will be asked to thank the alumni who supported the scholarship. This is accomplished through thank your cards or letters and attending one to two alumni events during the year. Scholarship recipients should realize that they have a responsibility to contribute annually to the Medical Alumni Loyalty Fund at a time which is appropriate to each recipient.
